# A WORD FROM PASTOR MATT

It was the end of the first night of Vacation Bible School and I was sitting on the couch in the Garden's Edge trying to get caught up on some computer work and make sure we were ready to go for tomorrow night. Two of the parents were sitting on the other couch waiting for VBS to finish up. I did not look very pastoral at all. I was wearing shorts and my neon green VBS t-shirt. If anything, I just looked like a leader for VBS. The two moms, not knowing I was the copastor, were talking very honestly about how much they were enjoying the VBS program this year. Of course this made me smile knowing that they had no idea who I was and I really appreciated hearing their honest feedback. And then one of the moms said, "And I can't believe they serve dinner every night and don't charge

for that. That is so nice." I finally piped up—"No child will ever go hungry in a congregation I serve."

When Jesus shows up, nobody ever leaves hungry. I am amazed that in a community as wealthy as our community is, there are still children among us that go to bed hungry every night; if it wasn't for free and reduced lunches at school and feeding programs like the Backpack Program at MUMC that we support, many more children would go hungry. When a child is hungry, they cannot concentrate on learning or concentrate on building relationships. When a child, or anyone for that matter, does not know where their next meal is coming from, how can they expect to ever be fully engaged in life?

When Jesus entered a deserted place, the gospel of John tells us that 5,000 people followed him. And his disciples were afraid that they might have a riotous group on their hands if Jesus didn't send them away to get something to eat. Yet, his reply to Philip was, "No, you give them something to eat." And of course, Philip's reply to Jesus is that would cost about 6 months' wages, or in today's figures-\$15,000, to feed this many people. And Philip isn't wrong. That works out to be about 3 dollars a person. You can't go to McDonalds anymore for \$3 and get a meal. But Philip either doesn't realize or he forgot that when Jesus shows up, nobody ever leaves hungry. And from five loaves of bread and two fish, 5,000 people left with full bellies and enough food was

leftover to fill 12 baskets. This is not just a miracle about sharing food. I know some pastors have made that analogy but we need to remember that sharing is not a miracle. And to be honest, we don't do a very good job sharing today. Do you know how much food is thrown out today? To be honest, what happened in that deserted place was a miracle but miracles like that one happen today.

When Jesus shows up, nobody ever goes away hungry. I believe that we experience this each week when we gather for worship. Jesus shows up and we leave our seats full. But worship isn't the only time we gather in this sacred place. We gather here for things like funerals and meetings. We gather here for Bible Study, fellowship, and education. When we gather, we need to make sure that nobody leaves hungry—both spiritually and physically. If we believe that Jesus is present in our sacred places, then we need to make sure nobody leaves hungry. If you see someone who is hungry, the command from our Lord remains the same for us today—you give them something to eat. The world might say there is no such thing as a free meal, but the church has been feeding people for the last 2,000 years. Our job is to make sure people leave here full because our job is to give the world Jesus. And when Jesus shows up and is present, nobody ever leaves hungry.







## So Many Chickens!

This year we asked the VBS kids to bring in a special offering so that we could buy chickens through the ELCA's Good Gift program. ELCA Good Gifts works with families, communities, and people in developing nations to get the help and support they need for sustainable farming and food practices. We set a goal of 200 chicks at \$1 a chick. On Tuesday, we blew past our goal, so we doubled it to 400 chickens. On the final night, 458 chickens had been donated and as of the end of August, 630 chickens have been collected. As a way to visualize how many chickens we raised, we had the kids color in sheets every time they turned in a dollar. Way to go kids!

# Michaelmas




The Feast of St. Michael and All Angels

Sunday, September 29 at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.

Michael the archangel, captain of the heavenly hosts, is remembered on this day along with the other angels and archangels. The word "angel" means messenger in Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. A festival dedicated to the honor of the archangel Michael arose in the fifth century in Rome. Michael is not a saint, but in Jewish angelology, one of the four archangels who carry out the will of God. The stories about Michael are war scenes situating him within the final battle between good and evil. The focus of the day has broadened to include thanksgiving for all the angels who are seen as messengers of the word and will of God.

# Being the Church...

### An interview with Frank and Becky Ropp by Mary Ann Marcantonio



Farming was a principal occupation in the Middletown Valley since the first settlers arrived around 1735. And as suburbia creeps even closer to our precious Valley, fewer farms remain. Many of these farms have been family owned for generations, for Frank, he was the sixth generation to work on his family's farm. But for the Ropps the saying goes "you can take the boy (or girl in Becky's case) off the farm...but you can't take the farm out of the boy". This couldn't be any truer for Frank and Becky.

Frank grew up in a family of seven children, he being the only boy, was very happy to tag along with his dad and leave his six sisters to do what girls will do. His love of farming was inspired in those early years, learning the trade from his father, Ralph Schlosser Ropp and his grandfather, William Franklin Ropp. But in those early years it was not just learning the trade but the passion and pride of loving the land and the animals that a farmer cares for is what was instilled in Frank. As we shared our time together it was very apparent that Frank had a very close relationship with both his dad and grandfather, but his grandfather he greatly admired. He was a veteran of World War I and lost his arm due to a combat wound. The government fixed him up with an artificial limb that was more of a nuisance than help and most times hung on a hook in the barn. One would think that might make anyone incapable of the chores of a dairy farmer but not this determined man. Frank witnessed a man that was not necessarily good in the field but the care he offered his animals, and at times the tender care when a cow was struggling, left a very impressionable impact on him...one that continues to live in Frank.

Becky had a very different story, where Frank had many siblings and cousins nearby, Becky had one brother with extended family all over the country. Born Rebecca Van Westenberg, her first two years were in Rockvillle, the town of her birth. Her family moved to Middletown Valley when she was two years old where her father was engaged in farming. But life would soon change for the Van Westenberg family. At the age of twelve Becky's mother had passed away. Although a loving father and brother, they were in new and unfamiliar territory of raising a teenage girl. While many of her friends were mooning over the latest in fashion and the latest celebrity, Becky took over many of the household chores, cooking and cleaning after a day at school. But in these difficult times, Becky had one stalwart presence in her life, her Aunt Lucile. Becky looked forward to Saturday morning phone calls with her aunt many times lasting hours or many weekend visits to her aunt's home. Her Aunt saw to it that she always got what she needed, especially at back-to-school time when her father never understood teenage fashion. Her Aunt was that female presence for Becky in her very male world.

Both Becky and Frank graduated from Middletown High School and while in school Becky was close

friends with one of Frank's sisters. As teenagers do, she had many sleepovers at the Ropp house where she was treated as if she was one of them. Even on a couple of occasions when they got into trouble, Becky got the same lecture as her friend. Eventually, the family that Becky loved became her own when she and Frank got married in July of 1976 at Zion by Rev. Hoover.

What was it like living in the Valley when you were young? Their two faces lit up as they recalled the days past. The five and dime store and the Acme grocery store; you could find most of what you ever needed right here in Middletown. Becky recalled going to Farmers Co-op and inspecting the feed sacks for the prettiest material and if it so happened to be on the bottom of the pile, the attendant was always gracious enough to dig it out for her, even if it meant one bag after another was lifted to free the desired bag. This is community!

Over the years, Frank and Becky have worked on a few different farms. The farm where they live currently is the Van Westenberg farm that her father purchased when Becky was small. They now have hung up their muckers and turned the farm over to their three kids, Mary, Will and Earl (Pete). Although not fully retired, they help when they can, mentoring and assisting the next generation of farmers. Now that those early milkings are behind them, they have the time and energy to spoil their three wonderful grandkids!

We in many senses have lost that community feel because our world today is no longer simple. We desire bigger and better, outdoing our neighbor and getting ahead in life. All of which may not be bad things but when it becomes more important than caring for our neighbor and each other, than these things get in the way of that community feel. Frank learned early through his grandfather that caring even for the weak of the herd makes the whole herd stronger and Becky learned through the tender love of her Aunt how to be mindful of the needs of others. This they practiced in raising their three children.

My take away was this: life is never easy! Hard work and persistence along with a strong faith is how we all survive. Frank, a sixth generation of Lutheran-believers raised here in the Valley, has taught faith through the examples of the generations before him and Becky. Although not born in the Valley, she had the influence of the Baptist Church in her upbringing. But life does become easier when we live a Christ-centered life. We are all not meant to be ministers, but we are all meant to live and share the gospel. Our mission field is whereever our two feet land. For all of us, our mission field is the home. The place where faith begins is in the home. We desire to give our children the very best, why would we hold the best from them...sharing Christ's love!

Becky and Frank attend the Sunday 9:00 a.m. service. They are two quiet people but what fun I had getting to know them. Thanks Becky and Frank!

## Zion showed up at Mar-Lu-Ridge!

Last year, we had 6 kids participate at Mar-Lu-Ridge. This year, Zion really showed up at Mar-Lu-Ridge by sending 15 kids to camp. A big hinderance for summer camp is the cost but we have been blessed with many generous people throughout the years to help create a fund to provide scholarships for kids to attend camp. For many of the kids that went this year, it was the first time being away from home and on their own. They learned about God, how to care for themselves, and created lasting memories!











This year, Mar-Lu-Ridge asked Pastor Matt, along with other leaders throughout our synod, to come and assist with staff development.

Pastor Matt did a class on the basics of Lutheranism and got to show off not only the Small Catechism but his ability to climb on top of tables.



We have an incredible relationship with Mar-Lu-Ridge. Come out on September 22 to hear how you can continue to partner with Mar-Lu-Ridge and make Mar-Lu-Ridge accessible to all people.

Despite our desire for Mar-Lu-Ridge to be a place that welcomes all people, some of our spaces do not reflect this commitment. Unintentionally, some areas of our buildings limit accessibility and full participation. Increasingly we turn guest groups away because we are unable to meet their accessibility needs. This is not the hospitality we claim and does not reflect our aim in welcoming all people to engage in this sacred place. As we plan for the future of MLR and the next generation of outdoor ministry, we are committed to be good stewards of our spaces and resources by:

- improving accessibility for all visitors and guests
- refreshing spaces within our existing footprint that will honor our commitment to conservation while better serving our ministry
- clearing the remaining debt for the reservoir to position MLR for strong financial footing

### **Project List**

As contributions to the With Open Arms Campaign are received, we have prioritized the following improvements to increase MLR's hospitality, inclusion, and accessibility for all people:

- 1. We will make the Ridge Inn fully accessible for all guests and visitors. An elevator will be installed so that guests with mobility needs may easily and safely access the top floor. Adding public restrooms on the lower level and installing automated doors will expand our hospitality in new ways.
- 2. Next, we plan to improve Cabin 3—our most-requested, most-used cabin—with an accessible restroom and a refreshed interior. Siding will replace the log exterior to prevent further decay from pests.
- 3. Carpenter bees have damaged a significant portion of Potomac Lodge's exterior log structure. New concrete siding will be added to protect this building.
- 4. Cabins 1 and 2 are beyond repair and are no longer in use. These buildings will be removed to allow for increased green space. The old swimming pool at Area 3 is no longer serviceable. We plan to remove this feature and level the ground for group gathering space. This area is in near-constant use thanks to renovations and upgrades by MLR staff. In time, we will develop this space with an accessible pavilion.
- 5. In 2020, MLR secured the main camp water reservoir, which was leaking. Gifts to the With Open Arms Campaign will help to quickly clear the remaining \$220,000 debt acquired for the reservoir development.
