



Being the Church...

Interview with Bruce Albright by Mary Ann Marcantonio

Many of us have been praying for Bruce Albright in his recent health scare. Many have been wondering how Bruce is doing, so I interviewed him. In telling his story, it helps to know a bit more about him and his wife, Carolyn.

Bruce grew up in Warwick, New York, a small dairy farming community 50 miles north of New York City. He graduated from Muhlenberg College, like his dad and uncle (a Lutheran pastor.) He majored in both history and Russian, and took a Contemporary Soviet Culture course which opened an opportunity for him to study abroad for two semesters. While in Russia he had a chance encounter with Alexander Solzhenitsyn, a Nobel Prize awardee for Literature, who had been persecuted by his government, and was still courageously able to keep his values despite risking re-imprisonment. This influenced Bruce immensely as his

young life unfolded and led him into a career as a supervisory attorney for the US Government.

Carolyn and Bruce met in a way that could make a blockbuster movie due to so many chance meetings. While in graduate school, Carolyn first met a high school classmate of Bruce's who introduced her to his parents; then she met Bruce's sister when she took a job at the University of Rhode Island; Carolyn's dean in the URI School of Nursing where she taught had Bruce as her paper boy in his youth. There were many other coincidences spanning five years. After a long engagement, they were married October 9, 1982 in an Armenian Orthodox Church by Carolyn's Armenian Priest and Bruce's Russian Professor, a Lutheran minister ordained in Latvia. If you saw the movie, *My Big Fat Greek Wedding*, just change Greek to Armenian and you've got the idea about the wedding ceremony and reception. There were two bands for their reception. At 10 pm the American Band packed up and the Armenian band cranked up the music. The venue had four other weddings that soon crashed Bruce and Carolyn's party and joined in the celebration.

Bruce always wanted to be a part of the Washington DC political life. He fortunately was mentored by US Congressman Ben Gilman. Besides being Bruce's mentor, Ben became a dear friend and in many ways a second father who influenced him to go to law school and enter public service as a federal government attorney. This encouragement launched a long career in legal services mostly for the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in which he held many positions within the agency. He also coached and mentored several hundred young lawyers who presently hold positions of responsibility in the government and private sector. Despite the pressures of work, Bruce found time to serve on nonprofit boards, including Mar-Lu-Ridge, Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Seminary Ridge Museum and Educational Center, and assist Venture Crew 758 at Camp Catoctin BSA. He is an Eagle Scout.

The mortgage crisis in 2008 and the years following as a senior counselor for HUD, meant Bruce worked very long hours putting in about 18 hours a day and more often than not, staying overnight at the home of a friend who lived in Arlington. But this took a toll on him and his family, so in 2020 it was time to think about "what do I do with the rest of my life." After a career of 42 years Bruce was ready for retirement... catching up on reading those books that have been waiting for him, tending to his garden, the hikes planned but never completed and a host of other things. So in January 2020, Bruce said good bye to friends, co-workers and that ugly commute down I-270.

But after 2 years of retirement, things began to change. After Christmas 2021, both Bruce and his wife came down with colds. Carolyn recovered quickly but he did not. He chalked up his lack of improving as a result of wallboard dust due to long overdue home renovations. In May 2022 after numerous tests were done, cardiologists found that his heart was working at one-fifth capacity. He was treated with the drugs used for heart failure (including one designed by his niece, a pharmaceutical research developer) and a combination defibrillator pacemaker was implanted. Unfortunately, there was no improvement. By March 2023, Bruce could barely walk a ¼ mile. The concerns grew as Bruce was always active and walked 3 to 4 miles a day. At a routine doctor's visit, it was suggested that he explore alternative heart therapy. It was at this visit when the option "heart transplant" was first heard.

Bruce and Carolyn made an appointment at John Hopkins Hospital for the 12th of May. By this time Bruce's physical stamina was very weak but he was determined to walk into the hospital on his own and admitted immediately. He had been diagnosed with congestive heart failure-but it wasn't until after the transplant surgery when it was discovered that the failure was caused by rare Cardiac Sarcoidosis of the heart. After several months of preparing that a transplant might be his only option, because of his age, a transplant would not be available. Bruce had just turned 70. Johns Hopkins viewed 70 as riskier outcomes, given a limited number of organ donors. The spunk in Carolyn was fired up! As a former ICU nurse manager and a nurse educator for years with a doctoral degree, she applied simple logic and love for her husband. So, "if a 69 years old comes in", she asks, "just 6 months younger than Bruce and has no medical conditions, a transplant would be performed, but a man six months over without other conditions doesn't qualify?" What an advocate they had on their hands! Using her vast medical knowledge and research skills, she and three other doctors on the transplant team convinced the Hopkins transplant team to do at least the tests necessary to determine his overall health. By the end of May, every test imaginable was completed and Bruce was found to be in great health...except the heart.

Through persuading by Bruce's family, prayers from both known and unknown prayer warriors, and the compassion and love of a very caring God, Bruce's name was added to the national waiting list for a heart. He was told to be patient and that the wait could be at least six months. While waiting, his doctors and nurses told him that the patients that recovered best have a regular exercise regimen. He walked the corridors of the Cardiac Critical Care Nursing Unit starting at two trips a day to eight times a day; he built up the ability to use a stationary bike while sitting two hours a day. One of his nurses saw to it that he was able to "rock" with tunes from Led Zeppelin, Rolling Stones and other bands as he made the many laps

and "bike trips" from his room. He insisted on being up, out of bed, bathed, and dressed before breakfast came every day. Meanwhile, the search for a heart of someone with the same weight, height and blood type as Bruce had begun. It is during this time that Bruce receives a very uplifting message from Zion; a video taken from the lectern, with those in attendance waving hello and of course mountains of prayers with many cards and letters that followed!

Early morning of June 28th, at 7:30 a.m., he received the news that a heart was found. After calling his family, he was wheeled out of his room towards the surgical wing, the entire staff that got to know him for six weeks clapped and cheered as he was escorted down the hall. The doctors had explained to Carolyn that the surgery would be about 10 to

12 hours. You can only imagine the fear in her face as the cardiac transplant surgeon doctor entered the waiting room just five hours later. The surgeon emphasized that Bruce did remarkably well and added,

"We normally have to jump start the heart but it began beating, unassisted on its own." Bruce spent three days in ICU and then went to a step down unit. On July 14th, just 16 days after receiving his new heart, he was released to enjoy his life. WOW! With 28 doctors and numerous staff, Bruce has only words of praise and gratitude to wonderful caring professionals at John Hopkins. It is sixteen months since Bruce came home and his new heart is performing well. He can do about 85% of what he was able to do before the onset of his heart disease. The biggest concerns for him now are infections and rejection of the heart.

If you encounter Bruce at church or in public, he may stand at a distance, because of risk of inadvertent infection, as well as being overwhelmed by numbers of people in a small space. Although he loves to see and talk with everyone, stress and infection risk causes him to avoid some social settings.

So what is the take away from my conversation with Bruce? The power of prayer has an impact on our lives and those we love but it can even change circumstances. In Bruce's case, he anticipated a long wait for a matching heart but circumstances changed. In a short period of time, a match was found and through the God-given talents of medicine and God's great mercies, Bruce is a reminder that miracles are still happening today. He emphasized that it was prayers that reinforced his attitude of "never give up!" The prayers had another unexpected twist, more was received than asked for. As a result of his recovery, circumstances have changed. Four otherwise healthy individuals over 70 have received heart transplants at Johns Hopkins in 2024 and are doing well. How can we explain this? I have searched for words and the best I can come up with is that God loves us!

Note—as Tolstoy wrote in his novel, War and Peace, God is love and Love is God, and each one of us is a particle of that love. How true that is as applied to the above.

VBS free to everyone interested in participating, but that doesn't mean there isn't a cost.


It costs about \$50 a child to make VBS possible.

Our nearly 40 year old fire alarm system has finally reached the end of its life.

- •refreshing spaces within our existing footprint that will honor our commitment

Project List

As contributions to the With Open Arms Campaign are received, we have prioritized the following improvements to increase MLR's hospitality, inclusion, and accessibility for all people:

- 1. We will make the Ridge Inn fully accessible for all guests and visitors. An elevator will be installed so that guests with mobility needs may easily and safely access the top floor. Adding public restrooms on the lower level and installing automated doors will expand our hospitality in new ways.
- 2. Next, we plan to improve Cabin 3—our most-requested, most-used cabin—with an accessible restroom and a refreshed interior. Siding will replace the log exterior to prevent further decay from pests.
- 3. Carpenter bees have damaged a significant portion of Potomac Lodge's exterior log structure. New concrete siding will be added to protect this building.
- 4. Cabins 1 and 2 are beyond repair and are no longer in use. These buildings will be removed to allow for increased green space. The old swimming pool at Area 3 is no longer serviceable. We plan to remove this feature and level the ground for group gathering space. This area is in near-constant use thanks to renovations and upgrades by MLR staff. In time, we will develop this space with an accessible pavilion.
- 5. In 2020, MLR secured the main camp water reservoir, which was leaking. Gifts to the With Open Arms Campaign will help to quickly clear the remaining \$220,000 debt acquired for the reservoir development.




Ministry Updates




